It is the dewy shoes and freezing fingers.


Smiling eyes above the masks. Warming fires and pink sun-


New Screens

Sixth Form Careers Spotlight Event

The Sixth Form Careers Spotlight Event was a highly anticipated event this term. Our students were have the opportunity to listen to career discussions given by our prestigious alumnae.

The virtual event was held in two separate rooms with a choice of which discussions to listen to depending on their personal career path.



The participating alumnae had a range of experiences in different fields such as clinical research, psychodynamic counselling and product development to name just a few. The sixth form eagerly listened to the experiences and advice given by our alumnae and asked some challenging and insightful questions.

Some of the key takeaways from this event included encouraging the girls to not be too disheartened with rejection from job applications. They were encouraged to keep applying to vacancies even when the application process can become demoralising. One alumnae assured the students that an opportunity will always be around the corner.

Another key piece of advice was to create a LinkedIn account to use as a resource during their career search. Many questions were asked about their individual university experiences and the alumnae keenly shared top tips such as recommending the Year in Industry scheme an opportunity which could improve their CVs and accelerate a career in a chosen field.

In one of the rooms, there was discussion of the benefits of coding as a transferrable skill. One of our alumnae enthusiastically discussed how this skill allows her to move between industries and work from anywhere in the world. She stated that she enjoys how a software-based workplace is dynamic and exciting.

Each session reinforced how the students should demonstrate real world experience in their job applications. This could be a Year in Industry whilst at university or more generalised work experience. They were also asked to consider answering certain questions to assist them in job applications such as 'why are you applying to that company?' 'What are you interested in?' 'What do you want to learn about?'

One of the sessions focused on the importance of self-care and how prioritising your mental and physical health will help you throughout further education and as you start your career.

We would like to extend a huge thank you to the alumnae for giving their valuable time to this event. The sixth form greatly enjoyed these sessions, which have given them a lot of information and advice to consider over the Christmas break.

A Level Taster Day


Another great event this term was our A Level Taster Day for our Year 11 class.

The day involved individual subject taster lessons to give the pupils a taste of what they can expect during an A level lesson. This was also an opportunity to try subjects that are only offered as an A level.

Mrs Trevis organised enrichment activities to give the girls an overview of how sixth form life will be different to senior school. The activities on offer included the incredibly popular student cooking. Our current sixth formers have the option of student cooking every Wednesday. Additionally, our Year 11 were taken to Nuffield Health Gym, one of the activities which is offered to the sixth form.

A level students are also given the option to complete an EPQ (Extended Project Qualification). This is an independent research project, allowing students to write an essay on a topic of their choice. An EPQ is a way of adding to a CV before further education or entering the workforce. Some previous titles of EPQ projects include: "How has technology affected umpiring in cricket?" and "The effects and impacts of the Glorious Revolution on the Crown and Catholics today".

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Scholars Breakfasts

Our subject scholars were invited to Breakfast with Mr Smith this term. They were treated to hot chocolate and pastries. The scholars participated in lively debate and discussion relating to current events.

Our sports scholars were treated to an inspirational talk given by Lizzie Yarnold OBE, the most successful British Winter Olympian.

Mr Ives wrote this piece about this great opportunity:

How often does one get to have a double Olympic Champion, the most successful British Winter Olympian ever and the most successful Skeleton athlete ever, come to one's school? Not very often! So when the opportunity came to listen to Lizzy Yarnold, OBE, the athlete who travels at speeds of nearing 80mph, on what she herself said is sometimes called a 'tea-tray', it was an occasion not to be missed.

In an inspirational talk to the Sports' Scholars, 'She-ra' (as she is nick-named) spoke particularly of having the grit to overcome the emotion of failure, how if things go wrong, to 're-think the plan' and concentrate not on errors, but on 'What I can do right.' Through all the preparation and training, two things stood out, which were that the answers and lessons to be learned are within, and that one must continue to think of how one can get better. However, Ms. Yarnold was also keen to stress that whilst ultimate success comes from personal drive, it is okay to ask for help, and essential to have a good support team.

From her early beginnings of loving sport from a young age, to balancing studying and training whilst at university, the importance of communicating with others as a means of maximising performance was a constant.

Finally, a message for all scholars, for all pupils, for teachers and parents, in fact, for anyone who wants to achieve to the best of their potential.

When Lizzy first tried the Skeleton, she failed at her first go and very nearly quit then and there. Success rarely happens immediately and is always countered with a healthy dose of failure. In order to achieve, 'Don't panic', be prepared for 'a huge amount of hard work', enjoy what you do and success will come.




































It has been a busy term for trips at St Gabriel's. Our sixth form geographers visited Start Bay, Devon. The aim was to develop practical skills for their independent investigations which constitutes 20% of their final grade in this A Level. Albeit an important trip, lots of fun was had and they benefitted from some glorious weather!

The geographers examined coastal systems and sediments, and analysed human impacts on these natural processes such as coastal defences. The water cycle was carefully examined, studying the water and carbon in the soil through practical investigation.

Our new Year 7 class were treated to a residential trip to Calshot Activities Centre in Southampton. It served as a wonderful opportunity to strengthen new friendships that have been made this half of term. The whole trip was about team building and developing confidence whilst being away from home. The sixth formers were able to visit Parliament this term as part of their PSHE Programme. They benefitted from a tour of the Commons and the House of Lords. The trip included a workshop explaining representation and voting systems. Aspen, Year 13, commented how interesting it was to see how the House of Lords operates and felt that the workshop examining voting systems was a relevant topic to understand given the discussion of Proportional Representation at the Labour Party Conference.

Further trips included a Year 11 Trip to Bristol and a Y12 Geography trip to Greenham.
