Mrs Ruth Chaplin - Drama



Mrs Ruth Chaplin developed a passion for dancing and acting from a very young age, joining a local drama group when she was 10.

After taking A levels in Theatre Studies, Dance and Media and a degree in Media and Performance, she spent three years at the prestigious Bristol Old Vic Theatre School, developing her technical stage management skills. It was while she

was here that she was scouted to work on the production of television shows, including Skins, Mastermind and Cranford.

Mrs Chaplin eventually decided it was time to settle down with her family and turned her hand to teaching, which brought a whole new world of excitement and passion.

Her biggest love is physical theatre, being drawn to the inner emotions of a character and the interesting ways an audience can be presented with them. Her favourite production is Sister Act, because it is an uplifting, hilarious musical, full of fantastic music and great performers!

Her advice to students is "always treat every role you gain as an experience, often those in the smallest of roles can have the biggest impact. A principal is nothing without the performance around them."

Ms Jessica Hammett - Science



Ms Jessica Hammett's fascination for science came from studying the habitats around her when she was young. She has always been a strong communicator and concrete thinker and loved the challenge of biochemistry at university which she followed with a masters in Science Communication.

Ms Hammett's scientific hero is Fred Sanger, a British biochemist who won

the Nobel prize for chemistry twice, an amazing achievement.

As the whole of scientific method revolves around falsification of hypotheses, and this cannot be done without collecting evidence, Mrs Hammett believes school-based experiments are essential. Practical research offers the girls the opportunity to use apparatus, follow instructions and consider errors.

For those pupils interested in following a career in science, Mrs Hammett recommends that careful consideration is given to courses with industrial placements and be prepared for the difference between academic research and working in a company."

In the last two years, we have helped girls go to read Medicine, Veterinary Science, Engineering, Biomedical Science, Biology and Biochemistry. We have also had some really super talks from parents who work in science and have come in to share their area of specialism.

Hockey





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SoyKind



On Saturday 22 February, our Year 12 Student Business Challenge Company, SoyKind, set up a stall to sell their reusable food wraps at a pop-up shop event in the Kennet Centre, Newbury. Trading alongside teams from other schools, it was pleasing to see the large number of stalls with an ethical or environmentally friendly focus.

To maintain their plastic free approach, our team had investigated purchasing an alternative to the traditional plastic pull up banner by adopting one made from recyclable card with a base lined with wild flower seeds that could be planted out afterwards. However, at over double the price of a standard reusable banner it was beyond their budget and could not be justified from a business perspective.

Undaunted they utilised the skills of team member, Issy, who set up an easel and canvas and painted their logo at the event; a great move that created interest. Although the Kennet Centre was particularly quiet at the end of half term week, the team sold some wraps and developed their skills in talking about their business with members of the public. The team have sold their food wraps, which are vegan friendly as they do not use beeswax, at a few school events. With face to face sales curtailed they are now developing their social media presence and reviewing ways to sell online.

Robotics Challenge

Geography



We often talk about the importance of balance and having a balanced approach to the curriculum, but what do we mean by that? Recycling and reusing other resources was also part of this time-limited challenge.

Teaching Remotely



As new teaching methods have been initiated across all subjects, pupils and teachers alike are embracing new technologies. It is challenging but exciting at the same time.

The girls have done a superb job so far, we are impressed by their ability to adapt. New ways of teaching and learning in Mandarin, for example, have included writing and online marking with Year 11, video lessons with Year 10 and dictation with Year 7. More examples are being shared regularly on social media.

Unfortunately the exchange was cut from the original six weeks to three due to Covid-19 and it was slightly scary to be abroad whilst everything was happening.

Nonetheless, I had an amazing experience that I will never forget. Isabella and I are already working with our families to see each other again once it is safe enough to travel.









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





