
The Astounding Broccoli Boy - Frank Cottrell Boyce

Clownfish - Alan Durant



The Boundless - Kenneth Oppel



Wonder - R J Palacio




The Tale of Despereaux - Kate DiCamillo


The Glass Swallow - Julia Golding
